Reading 1

Wis 18:6-9

The night of the Passover was known beforehand to our fathers, that, with sure knowledge of the oaths in which they put their faith, they might have courage.

Your people awaited the salvation of the just and the destruction of their foes.

For when you punished our adversaries, in this you glorified us whom you had summoned.

For in secret the holy children of the good were offering sacrifice and putting into effect with one accord the divine institution.

A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures. In this passage from Wisdom, the scene is the night of the Exodus from bondage in Egypt. The fathers refer to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. They have placed their faith in God. This passage is a poem on faith. Whatever happens to human beings, faith in God assures us that somehow God's saving grace will prevail. "The night of the Passover was known beforehand to our fathers, that, with sure knowledge of the oaths in which they put their faith, they might have courage." another. Rabbi Hillel, who lived in the time of King Herod in Jerusalem, is viewed by historians and scholars as being the originator of the Golden Rule later enunciated by Jesus in Matthew 7:12, this is the whole Torah and everything else is commentary.

Once a heathen came to Rabbi Shammai and said, "I will gladly accept the Jewish faith, provided you can teach me the entire Torah while standing on one leg." When the Rabbi heard these insolent words, he seized his measuring rod and drove the heathen out of his house. The heathen then went to call on Rabbi Hillel and said, "I'll gladly accept the Jewish faith, provided you can teach the entire Torah while standing on one leg." Now just as Shammai was wrathful in his response, Hillel was gentle and understanding. He said to the heathen, 'Do not unto others what you do not wish that others do unto you.' Thus, this is the whole Torah. Everything else is only commentary. Go and learn."-A Treasury of Jewish Folklore, Nathan Ausubel.

Reading 2

Heb 11:1-2, 8-12

Brothers and sisters:

Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen.

Because of it the ancients were well attested.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place that he was to receive as an inheritance;

he went out, not knowing where he was to go.

By faith he sojourned in the promised land as in a foreign country, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, heirs of the same promise; for he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and maker is God.

By faith he received power to generate, even though he was past the normal age —and Sarah herself was sterile—for he thought that the one who had made the promise was trustworthy.

So it was that there came forth from one man, himself as good as dead, descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sands on the seashore.

A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures. In this reading from Hebrews, reference is made to the first reading and to the "father" of faith, Abraham. "By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place...and not knowing where he was to go." Note that faith in God makes the development and journey spiritually meaningful and fulfilling. "Whenever I am tempted, whenever clouds arise, when song gives place to sighing, when hope in me dies, I draw the closer to Him, from care he sets me free...for His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches over me daily." -Anonymous. The initial sentence of this reading is a well-known and often quoted definition of faith speaking to the heart of what it means to have realization "the what faith of is hoped for and evidence of things not seen." Trying to define or explain faith can be challenging and illusive; however, here are other attempts to plumb the depth and breadth of the dynamics of faith:

What is the meaning and message of these quotations which are like laser beams penetrating to the heart of one's soulfulness? What is your definition, explanation, or example of faith?

- 1. "Faith is the touching of a mystery. It is to perceive another dimension to absolutely everything in the world. In faith, the mysterious meaning of life comes through...To speak in the simplest possible terms: faith sees, knows, senses the presence of God in the world." -Alexander Schmemann, a Russian Orthodox priest.
- 2. "Faith is not a momentary feeling but a struggle against the discouragement that threatens us faces every time we meet resistance." Bakole wa Ilunga, a Catholic archbishop in Zaire.
- 3. "Faith means being grasped by a power that is greater than we are, a power that shakes us and turns us, and transforms and heals us." Paul Tillich.
- 4. "Faith faces everything that makes the world uncomfortable pain, fear, loneliness, shame, death, and acts with a compassion by which these experiences are transformed, even exalted." Samuel Mueller
- 5. "True faith can only grow and mature if it includes the elements of paradox and creative doubt. Such doubt is not the enemy of faith but an essential element of it. For faith in God does not bring the false peace of answered questions and resolved paradoxes." -Kenneth Leech
- 6. "Faith is to bring God back into the world, into our lives...to have faith in God is to reveal what is concealed." -Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel
- 7. "Faith enables us to perceive the mysterious meanings of life, to live with paradox and contradiction, to confront and overcome obstacles in life, and to be a home where God, the ground of our being, is always present with us and for us."— Anon.

Jesus said to his disciples:

A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures. In the Gospel of Luke, we are to be like the faithful servants as mindful, vigilant, and ready for the coming of the Lord.

Broaden your attentiveness to God, use a breath prayer or mantra such as, breathing in: God is with and for me, and breathing out: "I am mindful of God here and now." Or, find a song and let the buoyance of the lyrics lift you up, carry you, and renew your soul and send you back into the messiness and fray of daily living with renewed faith, hope, and love. I am suggesting the song "I can see clearly now" a ballad by Johnny Nash.

Our faith helps us remain focused, prepared, attentive, ready, and mindful as the Gospel of Luke reminds us: "Let your belts be fastened around your waists and your lamps be burning brightly. "Mindfulness is the practice of aiming your attention, moment to moment, in the direction of your purpose. It is called mindfulness because you must keep your purpose in mind as you watch your attention. Then, whenever you notice that your aim has drifted off, you calmly realign it." (Frank Andrews)

Spiritual mindfulness is the presence of the moment we bring to the here and now. When we are mindful, we encounter the moment, and we are totally immersed in it. Consequently, we are not aware of the thousand, tiny fingers of distractions, assumptions, biases, prejudices, unconsciousness modalities, and mindless conditioning that imprison us and dulls us. "Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God." -Corrie ten Boom.

If you pay attention at every moment, you form new relationships to time. In some magical way, by slowing down, you become more efficient, productive, and energized while focusing without distractions on the tasks or human beings who are present to you. "Not only do you become immersed in the moment, more importantly you become the moment." (Michael Ray – Stanford University School of Business). How often might we say: "Where does the time go?" or "I did not have the time" or "Times flies" as found on the face of grandfather clocks inscribed in Latin as "Tempus fugit." Consider how much time is lost in waiting in line, attending meetings that drag on beyond the hour, idling at red lights, watching commercials, and reading e-mails.

Mindfulness can help us to be more energy efficient, rather than burning up in the tension and distractions of ordinary mindless living. Here are a series of questions you can mindfully respond to in your everyday lives:

- 1. What have I been paying the most attention to in my life this past week?
- 2. What dimensions of my experiences are seeking greater attention?
- 3. What specific activities do I want to bring greater awareness to?
- 4. How does becoming more mindful improve the quality of my life, my work, my relations, and my family?

5. What triggers or indicators have reminded me that I have drifted off to mindlessness?

Strive to bring your mind home realizing that the art of cultivating mindfulness is a lifelong process. Thus, be patient and know that every moment is an opportunity to increase your mindfulness of God's presence in your life. "In the Native way, we are encouraged to recognize that every moment is a sacred moment, and every action, when imbued with dedication and commitment to benefit all beings, is a sacred act." (Dhyani Ywahoo)
