# Reading 1

### <u>Isaiah 2:1-5</u>

This is what Isaiah, son of Amoz, saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In days to come, the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest mountain and raised above the hills.

All nations shall stream toward it; many peoples shall come and say:

"Come, let us climb the LORD's mountain, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may instruct us in his ways, and we may walk in his paths."

For from Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations,

and impose terms on many peoples.

They shall beat their swords into plowshares

and their spears into pruning hooks;

one nation shall not raise the sword against another,

nor shall they train for war again.

O house of Jacob, come,

let us walk in the light of the Lord!

A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures.

The first Saturday/Sunday of Advent appears on the horizon like the historic Halley's Comet zooming toward the unknown, leaving a trail of beauty and wonder for all of us to ponder in awe. "Let us walk in the light of the Lord" who spans the universe. "The Lord is God; He has given us light" – Psalm 118:27.

Halley's Comet is arguably the most famous comet in history.

"As a "periodic" comet, it returns to Earth's vicinity about every 75 years, making it possible for a person to see it twice in one's lifetime. It was last here in 1986, and it is projected to return in 2061. Occasionally, larger fragments from Halley's Comet create fireballs—extra-bright meteors that can light up large portions of the sky. These rare outbursts are unpredictable but are often the most memorable part of the shower of light."-Internet.

Isaiah's powerful and enlightening words flash into view as the prophet announces his words as a "fore-teller" and a "forth-teller." As a "foreteller, he offers hints, facts, and features of a Messiah from cradle to crown. It is a message for his own time and a prophecy of an age beyond our own like the projected return of Halley's Comet in 2061! The first five verses will not be fulfilled until Christ returns as Lord and King. As a "forth-teller," Isaiah proclaims that Zion will loom large over all nations, like a comet shooting across the skies. Everyone is called to peace, which is the power of love and not the love of power, prosperity, and salvation. The ruler will be a model of right living. There will be no wars, violence, or oppression especially because of the color of one's skin - "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again." The world is tired from the burdens of war, violence, and oppression, and when will we listen and act upon the words of Isaiah? Isaiah concludes with the mandate, "Let us walk in the Light of the Lord" whose theme will be reflected in the second reading from Romans, let us then throw off the works darkness of and put on the armor of LIGHT. May we become a Comet penetrating and

illuminating the darkness of our hearts and making a pathway for Jesus to come into our hearts, heads, and hands in building the kingdom of God this Advent season.

# A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures.

In this reading from Romans, there is a movement from chapter 12, which consider the qualities and characteristics of a Christian, to this chapter 13 which flows into a call for action. We are challenged to live a genuine, authentic, and ethical life practicing the virtues of moral maturity – truth, goodness, honesty, integrity, faith, hope, and love - "Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us conduct ourselves properly as in the day, not in orgies and drunkenness." Paul does speak plainly and frankly; it is time to pursue a persistent and consistent life of moral and ethical behavior – as the fire and brimstone sermon goes,

"You are going to hell unless you change your ways!" Paul decides to have his audience complete a moral/ethical survey, he invites you as well.

How moral am I? The following is a self-evaluation, 5 = yes to 1=no.

Corresponding to these "classical" and cardinal virtues previously mentioned (truth, goodness, honesty, integrity, faith, hope, and love) is the

biblical imagery of Jesus as the Way, the Truth, and the Life as he identifies himself in the Gospel of John (14:6). At the beginning of this Advent season, Jesus is the true Light that enlightens and illumines the path of our spiritual journey into the world of tomorrow. These virtues are to be a leaven of salvation from the presence of sin within and around us as we hope, endure, and press on. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world, whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" – like a comet sailing through the universe on fire with the love the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

It is interesting to note that the birthday of Jesus is celebrated on December 25 which is not the actual day on which He was born. Rather, it is the feast day of ancient Roman Saturnalia. On this day, the Romans rejoiced because the daylight was growing longer. The god of light was beginning to overcome the god of darkness. They lit huge bonfires, believing that this helped the Sun god to defeat the god of darkness. The early Christians believed this was an opportunity to celebrate the birthday of Jesus, the light of the world who will overcome the darkness with the coming of spring.

#### Matthew 24:37-44

# A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures.

The Gospel of Matthew clearly reminds us to be vigilant, live a life of love, care, kindness, and social concern. Today's reading is a collection

of three vignettes: 1. Verses 37-40 portray those who have neglected to prepare – in what ways are we or will we prepare during our Advent journey; 2. Verses 41-42 highlight the values of choice and vigilance – what are we choosing to do about our lives? And 3. Verses 43-44 shock and startle us with the fact that Jesus is the "good thief" – will he catch us daydreaming or sleeping? The Gospel proclaims the message that this is the consummation of Jesus' ministry – diligent service and loving expectancy should always and everywhere characterize the faith of a Christian. The threefold qualities of a committed and dedicated Christian are faithfulness, readiness, and diligence – sounding like a theme song for Advent.

It once happened that a man lit a lantern and walked on his way. But the light went out. He rekindled the lantern; but it went out again. This happened repeatedly. Finally, the man said to himself: "How long am I going to tire myself with this lantern? I shall wait until the sun is shining, and then I shall walk in the light of the sun." As we begin this Advent time of waiting and expectation for the light, let us walk in the presence and lasting light of God's only son – Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. Do not be discouraged by December 21, the Winter Soltice – not the shortest day of the year, the shortest day of daylight.

Therefore, make the most of the shortest day of daylight, I did. My mother Verna was out shoveling snow which I am sure triggered my birth not in a snowbank, but within the bright lights of St. Vincent Hospital. "The Lord is God; He has given me life and light" – Psalm 118:27.

Final prayer: Today, we begin our Advent journey as we follow the light of God who manifests himself in the human drama of life. Your Son, Jesus pitches his tent among us, and the Holy Spirit lifts us up out of darkness into your life-giving presence and light that never dies.
