Bible Construction

Hello, I hope this day finds you and yours faith-filled, happy, and healthy. Today I would like to continue my discussion of Bibles, their differences, and the things you should consider when purchasing your Bible to read yourself or as a gift. In previous bulletins I have written about different translations, some word for word, some thought for thought, and some trying to balance both. I have also mentioned the difference between Catholic Bibles and Protestant Bibles, the importance of font size (I think this is the most important consideration - if the font is too small the Bible is basically useless, yeah been there, done that!). Today I would like to talk about function and type, as well as Bible cover materials and construction.

First, what are you going to do with your Bible? Basically, there are three different functions which correspond to three different types of Bibles. The three different types are: study Bibles, reading Bibles, and note-taking Bibles.

Study Bibles are filled with features: study notes, translation notes, timelines, single or multiple page introductions to each book of the Bible, cross-references to other passages that explain where a Biblical author, for example, in the New Testament is quoting from the Old Testament, word definitions, maps, articles, concordances (where a particular subject, say hope, or person, say Abraham, is referred to: book, chapter, verse), reading plans (to help you read your Bible in a year or three years, or to focus on different themes, say the miracles of Jesus), tables, charts, a table of weights and measures (did you know that 1 cubit = 18 inches, whereas, 1 handbreadth = 3 inches?). Many modern Bibles are loaded with pictures and graphics. It's all great, it is all interesting, it all can increase your understanding, but sometimes it's all just a little distracting, and you just want to read the Bible! Then maybe a reading Bible is for you.

With reading Bibles it's just you, the Holy Spirit, and the text — the inspired word of God, so read away with no distracting charts or features. Here you may want to look for Protestant thinline Bibles, such as the NET (New English Translation), large print thinline Bible by Thomas Nelsen publishing, or the NIV (New International Version) thinline by Zondervan. For a Catholic reading Bible I would recommend the RSV2CE (Revised Standard Version Second Catholic Edition) thinline, large-print Bible published by Catholic Bible Press. Finally, just a few words about note-taking Bibles.

Bulletin Article Continued...

Note-taking Bibles may be study Bibles or reading Bibles, but the most notable feature (yea I know) about note taking Bibles is that they have typically two inch margins. Usually, the margins are located on the outer edge of each page of the Bible, though layouts may vary concerning where the text is versus where the space for notes is. Of course this creates a wide Bible that might be hard to fit in a backpack or motorcycle pannier! But, if you love to take notes, this type of Bible may well be for you! Also, if you are artistically minded, the note taking space can be used for your own drawn pictures, and/or calligraphy (artistically stylized words or letters). As wonderful as study notes and pictures in your study Bible are, its nice to have your own notes and your own art. A variation of this type of Bible is an inter-leafed Bible. This is a Bible that has blank pages after every page of the Bible text, so there is lots of room for notes and art. But this often creates a very large Bible with very small print.

So what type of Bible is for you: a study Bible, a reading Bible, or a note-taking Bible? Nothing says you can't have all three, quite frankly this is what I recommend. Now just a word about cover materials and construction.

Yes, three types of Bibles and three types of cover materials: paperback, hard cover, and leather or leather-type. Let's say you're buying a large study Bible, paperback won't last! (Yea, been there, done that). So if you are buying a large Bible I recommend hardcover or leather. Also, if you are taking notes in your Bible, hardcover works the best as your Bible will be more solid and firm to write in. Next, is the Bible spine glued or smyth sewn? Glued Bibles don't last. Pages, even whole sections start falling out! (You guessed it. Yea, been there, done that.) Buy a Bible with a smyth sewn binding, especially if it is a large study Bible.

Finally, to keep your Bible together don't store it on the spine. Look at any book that is stored upright on its spine — the top part of the spine is pulled apart from the binding. Then look at the bottom of the spine and it is still intact. Gravity is real! Instead, store your Bibles by laying them flat on their back covers. I am way over. Next time I will tell you about my personal favorites when it come to Bibles.
