Reading I

Acts 12:1-11

In those days, King Herod laid hands upon some members of the Church to harm them.

He had James, the brother of John, killed by the sword, and when he saw that this was pleasing to the Jews he proceeded to arrest Peter also.

-It was the feast of Unleavened Bread.-

He had him taken into custody and put in prison under the guard of four squads of four soldiers each.

He intended to bring him before the people after Passover.

Peter thus was being kept in prison,

but prayer by the Church was fervently being made to God on his behalf.

On the very night before Herod was to bring him to trial, Peter, secured by double chains,

was sleeping between two soldiers,

while outside the door guards kept watch on the prison.

Suddenly the angel of the Lord stood by him

He tapped Peter on the side and awakened him, saying,

The chains fell from his wrists.

The angel said to him, "Put on your belt and your sandals."

He did so.

Then he said to him, "Put on your cloak and follow me."

So he followed him out,

and came to the iron gate leading out to the city,

which opened for them by itself.

A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures

In this reading from Acts, the commitment and zealous posture of James and Peter bring about dire consequences. At the hands of the wicked King Herod Agrippa 1 and the Pharisees, James loses his head. Peter is more fortunate, he is jailed. Luke, author of Acts, chooses to demonstrate the miraculous and dynamic presence of God in the life of Peter who is the great escape artist. The situation is hopeful, security is doubled, and Peter is sleeping when suddenly he is freed from the bondage of alien forces. After this experience, Peter expresses a deeper awareness of God's presence and intervention that his call assumes a message that is larger than life. "Now I know for certain that

the Lord sent his angel and rescued me from the hand of Herod and from all that the Jewish people had been expecting."

A reflection, exegesis, and commentary on the scriptures.

This reading from Timothy is a reflection on a spiritually mature Paul who is near the end of his life. Despite his many experiences of suffering, persecution, rejection, and encounters with death, his commitment to preach the Good News is even more steadfast. He is at peace. He has achieved a degree of wholeness and holiness. He is not afraid of what will happen. He is confident that God is with him. Paul's words give evidence of a spirituality which is born out of suffering and

persecution expressed as a spirituality of imprisonment. He remains faithful to the spirit whispering to him of new and wonderful paths.

What might be qualities or characteristics of a spiritually mature Paul as a member of the community of saints. The following are quotations that are like stained glass reflecting the various hues of St. Paul's sanctity manifesting the face of God.

Many saints – "There are many leaves, piles of them. More saints than you could ever dream of. Each one singular. They are many assorted colors as they said down in the autumn air like fearless sky divers. They are so trusting, letting go completely. They tell me that one does not need to be cultivated to be beautiful. They tell me that the soul remembers its essence if it is given room to grow." Gunila Norris, Journeying in Place.

The Geese – The geese best represent the communion of saints. The geese fly in the wake of one another's wings. They get a lift from one another. Geese tell me that it is, indeed, possible to fly with equals." - Gunilla Norris, Journeying in Place.

Divine action – "Divine action has always been the source from which flows a torrent of grace which spreads over everything. I shall no longer

seek it within the narrow confines of a book or the life of a saint, or a sublime idea." -Jean Pierre de Caussade.

Lives of the saints – In the Buddhist tradition, the faithful are advised to examine the lives of the compassionate ones to see how they might respond to suffering. Christians do the same when they study the lives of the saints.
